



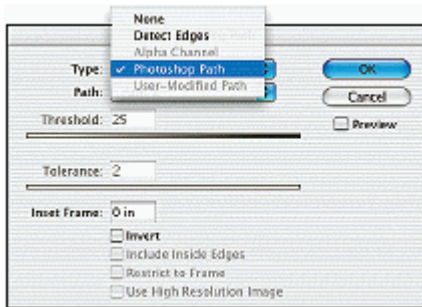

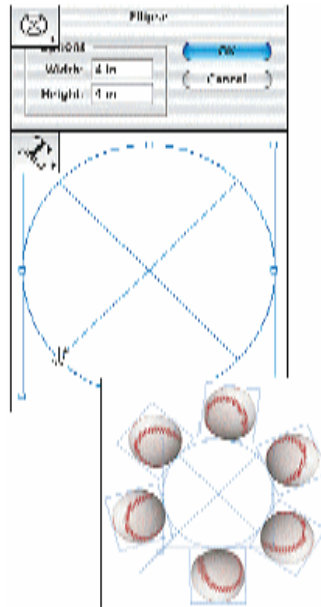


command + Option + Shift + K). Under Type, select Photoshop Path. Click OK. Using the Selection tool (V) select the ball image, choose Edit > Cut (Command + X). Using the Ellipse Frame tool, press Option and click in the center of the page. Use the options in the resulting Ellipse dialog box (left) and click OK.

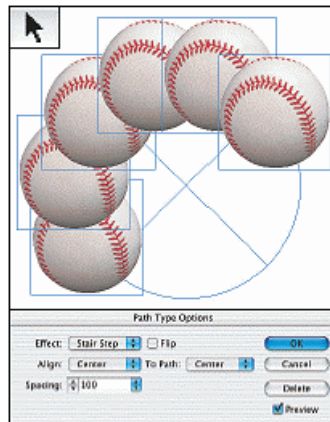
Launch InDesign. Choose File > New > Document (Command + N). For Page Size, select Letter and click OK. Choose File > Place (Command + D). You can use your own image, but if you want to use the one shown in this tu-

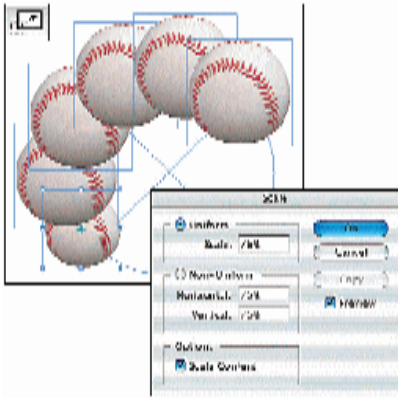
The ball file has a Photoshop clipping path embedded into it; to make sure the path is turned on, select the ball, go to Object > Clipping Path (Com-



Select the Path Type tool (Shift + T), place your cursor at the bottom left corner of the ellipse, and click when a 'plus' sign appears. Choose Edit > Paste (Command + V), and place six balls along the circle. Click the Selection tool and click on the ellipse. Choose Type > Type on a Path > Options. Use the options in the resulting Path Type Options dialog box and click OK.

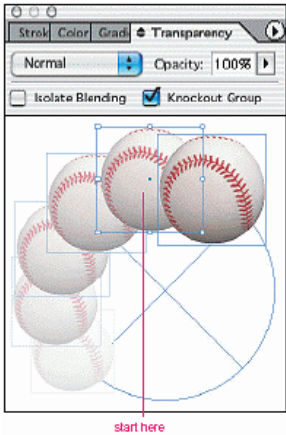


Using the Selection tool, select the last ball on the left. Double-click the Scale tool (S) and enter 75% under Uniform Scale. Click OK.



Repeat this step with the remaining balls, increasing the scale percentage by 5% for each ball that follows. Select the ellipse and choose Window > Transparency (Shift + F10).

In the Transparency palette click the Knockout Group box.



Select each ball individually starting with the one shown, adjust the opacity 75% and decrease the transparency of the remaining balls by 15%.



The final effect is shown at left.
